Minimising Labels

Many children and adults act in a way that fits with the how we feel others think about us, which can be damaging for those still trying to find themselves. We are trying to amend our use of language in school to avoid using any 'you are..." phrases – let me try to explain.

As an example, if you constantly hear, "you are so clever," "you are a genius," you can develop a self-talk that reflects that. Many will feel the need to maintain that 'status' and place great value on answering questions that they have a high chance of getting right, therefore getting the adult to confirm that, "you are so brilliant." This risks developing into a fear of failure and therefore a reluctance to take on questions/challenges that might result in error, which immediately puts a cap on potential progress.

The alternative language (i.e. "that was a clever thing to do," "what a genius answer that was") limits the praise to an isolated moment and reduces the impact on a child's self-talk. To further support this, we are placing the emphasis of praise on the effort that is being made rather than the outcome. When thinking about a tougher challenge that might not result in success, the child still knows that they can receive the same level of praise and feedback for their effort, as that isn't linked to the outcome.

The same is of course true, and arguably more important, with the language used when more negative things have occurred. The days of, "you are unkind" have surely gone to be replaced with, "that was an unkind thing to do," again aiming the comment on that particular act rather than at the character of the child.

For any human to be perpetually told "you are this or you are that" impacts their view of themselves and who knows how that manifests itself. To conclude with a World Cup analogy, if Neymar misses a penalty, the comment should be, "that was a bad penalty" rather than, "he's terrible at football" as that clearly isn't true!
