GO GREEN THIS CHRISTMAS!

Have you started to write your Christmas list? You can make it more eco-friendly to help save the planet and animals.

Think about asking for:

- second hand toys and books (sometimes it doesn't matter if something has been used or not);
- toys made in the UK or Europe (less travel = smaller carbon footprint);
- books printed in the UK (so they don't have to be shipped from somewhere outside of Europe);
- good quality toys which last for longer (you usually can't recycle plastic toys so they end up in landfill or, even worse, the Ocean);
- no plastic toys in your stocking, or even you can think about not using stockings at all (to avoid getting small toys which quickly ending up in the bin);
- instead of one of your presents you can ask for an adoption of the animal (you can virtually adopt for example a dolphin, a tiger, an otter and many other animals plus you can get cuddly toys, together with an adoption certificate - check WWF or The Wildlife Trust).

Have you got a toy you don't like? Don't bin it! Sell it, give it away or, best, donate to a charity.



PROJECT SANTA

Dear RGS Family,



I am sure most of you have all started to think about Christmas and how it is fast

approaching. I am sure we are all ready to try and have a normal post Covid Christmas this year with meeting our families, sharing amazing food and gifts with each other.

However, Christmas always makes me stop and take a moment to think of those that struggle to celebrate Christmas. Those who can't buy presents or food for their children and each year this pains me a little more.

A team of friends get together every year with local schools to collect for children and their families who are known to their schools and social workers to be living in poverty. The team, known as *Project Santa*, facilitate gifts and food hampers for these identified families and this year, we are trying to help 402 children with gifts bags and over 184 families with food hampers to help feed the families during the holidays. This includes treats during the festive season.

WE NEED YOUR HELP

As you can imagine, this is no mean feat. We are reaching out to our networks to help us put smiles on those little children's faces. We are looking for gifts for children aged 6-16yrs for both boys and girls as well as monetary donations for food hampers.

If you can help by providing a gift (usually a toy or age-appropriate main gift, a sweet treat and something to keep them warm) the school have very kindly offered to take the presents in at the Junior School reception and I will collect these at the end of each school day. Please could I request that you do not wrap these gifts and simply place in a gift bag with the age of the child and if it's for a boy or girl on the tag. **The deadline for donations is Fri 3rd December**.

Monetary donations can be made via our just giving account (use the QR code below) or directly into the *Project Santa* account.

Thank you in advance as any help that you can give makes a

huge difference and we really appreciate any gift, money or just spreading the word.

Last week, Year 6 were investigating the area and perimeter of compound shapes. We decided to take it out on the corridor and just look at the creativity and mathematics on show!


